

# ARCHAEOLOGY IN WALES

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The Council for British Archaeology exists to advance the study and practice of archaeology in Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and in particular to promote the education of the public in British archaeology, and to conduct and publish the results of research. It also co-ordinates and represents archaeological research in the United Kingdom. In carrying out these objectives, the Council provides a forum for the discussion of problems relating to the protection and study of the archaeological heritage for its member organisations, which span the universities and colleges, national and local museums, archaeological societies, professional and archaeological units and local authorities. It acts as the voice of British archaeology in relation to Government, the media, and other conservation and amenity bodies. Through its specialist committees it formulates policies for action and research, and actively promotes these policies. Through its publications and its fifteen Regional Groups it seeks to keep the archaeological community abreast of the latest developments in the subject.

CBA, Wales serves the whole of Wales and holds several meetings each year. The Annual General Meeting takes place in Shrewsbury in October, and a Spring meeting, normally in March, is held at various centres usually at the invitation of local societies. On these occasions there is a business meeting in the morning, when issues of local and national archaeological concern are reported and discussed, and the afternoon is devoted to illustrated talks on recent excavations and other topics. Occasionally day-schools and field meetings are also held. Archaeology in Wales is produced annually and issued free to all members. Its contents include accounts of excavations, surveys and discoveries of field monuments and artefacts of all periods from prehistory to industrial. The journal is an invaluable source of information for anybody working in the field of Welsh archaeology or history.
